

## **GOAL WRITING TUTORIAL**

Goals in the IEP focus on the skills and behaviors the student needs to learn to be involved and progress in the general curriculum.

**Goals are broad statements** which describe what a student could be reasonably expected to accomplish within one year while receiving special education instruction and services.

## Each goal statement includes the following (5) components:

☑Direction of Change
☑skill or Behavior to be changed
☑Present Level of Performance (FROM)
☑Expected Level of Performance (TO)
